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Story of Azad Hind Bank

Before independence, the picture of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose was also printed on the Indian currency. A replica of this currency issued by Azad Hind Bank can be seen on the currency display board of the main branch of State Bank of India located at Bank



Road in Gorakhpur city of Uttar Pradesh.

He also got a lot of support for the war that Netaji had started to liberate the country. People also donated in a big way. A bank was also created in April 1943 to handle these money. Its name was 'Azad Hind Bank'. This bank was



established in Rangoon, the capital of Varma. Varma is now known as Myanmar.

In the olden days, even the king-maharaja used to issue coins in his name, so in the same way this government of Netaji also issued its currency through 'Azad Hind Bank'. The countries which supported '



Azad Hind Sarkar' also recognized this currency.

The ten countries that supported the Azad Hind government and the army were Verma, Croatia, Germany, Nanking (present-day China), Manchukuo, Italy, Thailand, the Philippines and Ireland that recognized the bank and its currency.



From ten rupees coins to one lakh rupees notes were issued by the bank. The picture of Subhas Chandra Bose was printed on the one lakh rupee note. Prior to this, only the information of 5000 notes issued by Azad Hind Bank was public. A five thousand note is also kept in BHU's

Bharat Kala Bhawan.

Subhash Chandra Bose had arranged for the printing of notes for the Azad Hind government with the help of Japan-Germany. Germany had issued many postage stamps for the Azad Hind Fauj, which are called Azad Postal Stamps. Werner and Maria von Exter-Heidtlas

designed these stamps. These stamps are included in the Freedom Struggle Stamps of India Post today.
