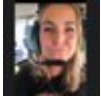

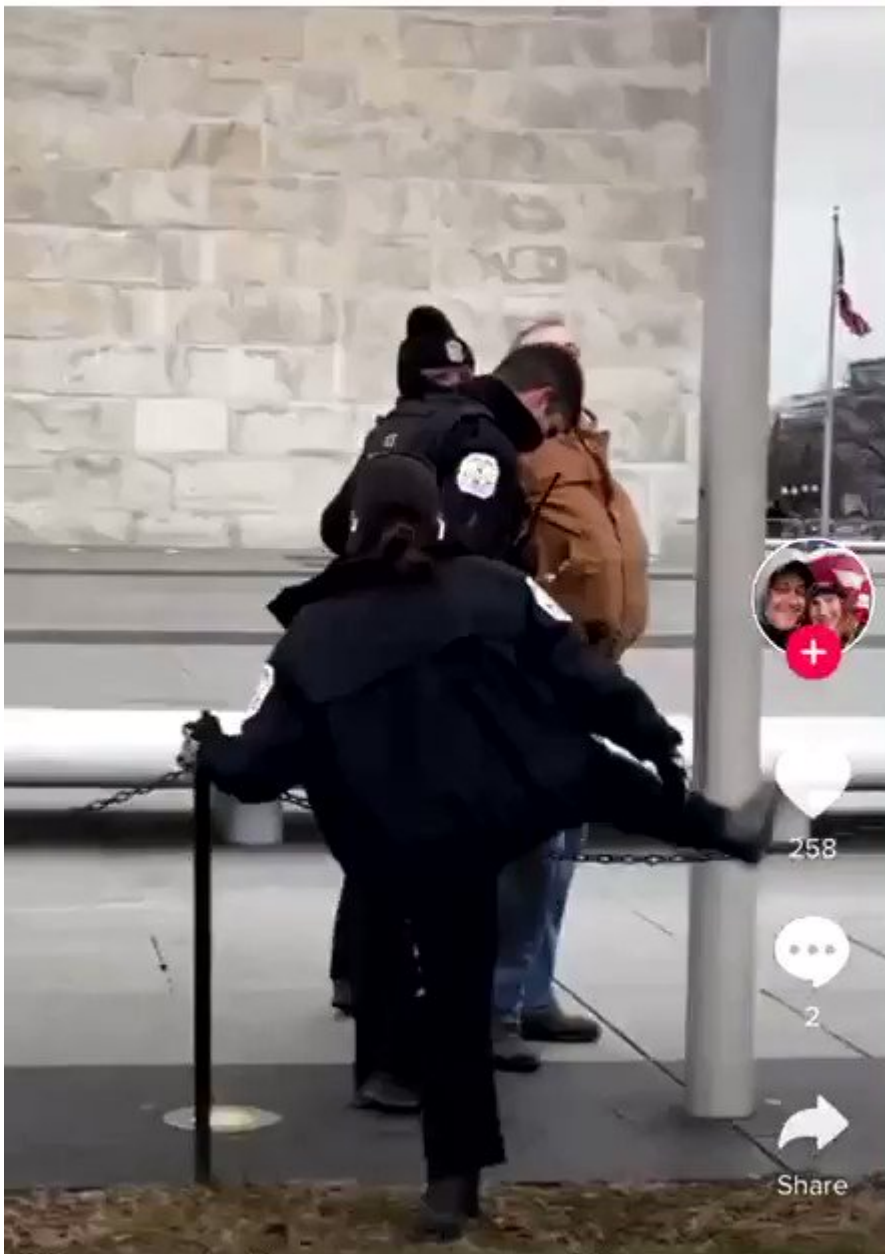

USPP FOP Labor Committee Provides Congress Police Reform Proposal

The United States Park Police Fraternal Order of Police Labor Committee (USPPFOP) today provided Congress with an outline proposing a series of policy reforms for federal law enforcement. Among the changes suggested are a call for mandatory body-worn cameras, enhanced training for use of force and self-defense, and a restoration of minimal staffing levels.

"Our officers are proud of the work we do," said USPPFOP Chairman Kenneth Spencer, "but we recognize that there is always room for improvement. Our mission is to protect and serve the public and the current disharmony between law enforcement and some members of the public is something we want to help address."

Spencer said that "the single most effective reform" would be a congressional mandate of a body-worn camera system for all federal officers. "Ultimately, what matters is that the truth be told. Body-worn cameras allow both the public and officers to be confident that the facts will be uncovered without misrepresentations."
