As #brexit talks drift towards the rocks, trade groups say plans for Irish Sea trade border after Brexit are 'in a mess' via, my latest via <a href="mailto:@FT">@FT</a> ...this is an issue coming deal or no deal. Stay with me 1/

<u>@FT</u> So to recap, under Northern Ireland protocol negotiated in the Withdrawal Agreement all goods going from Great Britain to NI must confirm with EU customs code. To avoid new border in Ireland, that means trade border in Irish Sea - new paperwork, new systems. Operational Jan 1/2

<u>@FT</u> The problem is that because the FTA negotiations are stuck, the negotiations in the Joint Committee on how to implement the Protoocl (and <u>@michaelgove</u> is with <u>@MarosSefcovic</u> talking today) haven't yet born fruit. That means a LOT of uncertainty. /3

<u>@FT</u> <u>@michaelgove</u> <u>@MarosSefcovic</u> How much uncertainty? Well, as <u>@MichaelAodhan</u> tells me, a lot. Research by the Northern Ireland Business Brexit Working Group (NIBBWG) found only 20% of members were ready. And its not their fault: need info on tarifs, computer systems etc. And are not getting answers /3

## Key Findings

- Businesses are not ready for what is expected to be implemented 1 January 2021. Fewer than 1 in 5 of our respondents considered themselves prepared for the end of the transition period.
- The main reason why they are not prepared is that they have not been given the necessary
  information to do so. Other causes of a lack of preparation are the impact of the Covid-19
  pandemic and a lack of resources.
- The vast majority of our respondents purchase products from GB, which makes them directly impacted by the new arrangements to be in place from 1 January 2021
- Almost 9 out of 10 of our respondents were aware of the Trader Support Service, which is designed to assist businesses in moving goods from GB into NI
- Over 70% of our respondents had registered for the TSS, although only a third had advised their GB suppliers to do so too.
- The message about registering for the TSS has got through but there are concerns about the lack of training, lack of detailed examples, lack of supporting materials, lack of time, etc. that mean there are growing concerns that it is being put forward as the clearest substantial 'step' for people to take to prepare.

# Northern Ireland's Meat Industry Needs Time to Implement New Arrangements

### Dear Mr Gove

As the UK embarks on the most widespread and precipitous change in any policy impacting the UK internal market and trade in 100 years, we are writing to warn you, that as a result of a lack of timely clarity from government on a whole range of issues and irrespective of the outcome of the FTA negotiations, the NI meat industry cannot be ready at the end of the Implementation Period on 31 December.

With less than one month until the deadline, government cannot expect our meat industry to be ready for this change, while it continues to amend policy, write legislation, draft guidance, develop systems and negotiate with the EU. It is simply impossible for businesses to plan and adhere to rules and systems that continue to evolve. An honest recognition of this should be the starting point for discussions about how this situation needs to be addressed moving forward.

Some form of phasing in or implementation period /8

Please find listed a number of fundamental issues that remain unresolved or where the existing (proposed) guidance is unworkable and businesses are seeking derogations:

- Trader Support Service will not go live until 21 December. The earliest that a test system will be available is 14<sup>th</sup> December, only 12 working days before the end of the implementation period. Until this happens, businesses cannot properly train staff
- unfettered trade to GB via Dublin port is of critical importance to NI processors serving the GB market and government has provided no guidance on how this will be delivered
- GVMS will not go live until 8 December, with full service not going live until 31
   December, raising serious questions about the industry's ability to prepare to use this system, not to speak of the consequences of further delays and bedding-in problems
- industry is waiting on clarity on the delivery of export health certification for GB to NI trade, with significant concerns over the availability of certifying vets and there has been no announcement of financial support for industry to cover these new costs impacting UK internal market agri-food movements

Because as <u>@RHARichardB</u> explains, supply chains work (particularly in food/supermarkets) on the basis that you DO catch that boat, because if you don't your perishable goods aren't going to be on the supermarket shelves on time. /10

Negotiations on both sides say a one-year 'implementation' period won't happen...but there will need to be flexibility /15
