"We're debating a step that has never been taken in American history" to overrule the voters, says <u>@ senatemajldr.</u> "This will be the most important vote I've ever cast."



"Nothing before us proves illegality anywhere near the massive scale...that would have tipped the entire election," says @senatemajldr.

"We cannot declare ourselves a national board of elections on steroids," adds <u>@senatemajldr.</u> Overruling states and courts would damage the republic forever.

Democracy "would enter a death spiral" and "every four years would be a scramble for power at any cost," says @senatemajldr.

"It would be unfair and wrong to disenfranchise the voters and overrule the courts and states," states <u>@senatemajldr.</u>
"I will not pretend such a vote will be a harmless protest gesture."

"The Congress does not determine the outcome of elections, the people do," says <u>@SenSchumer.</u> "The American people elected Joe Biden and Kamala Harris to be the next president and vice president of the United States."



"It is a very sad comment on our times that merely accepting the results of an election is considered an act of political courage," says <u>@SenSchumer</u>, referring to "an attempted coup."
