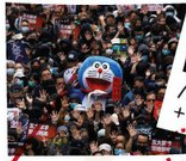

A man infected with mystery virus in China dies after outbreak

There's a mystery virus going around in Wuhan, China. The city's health officials said about 40 people have been diagnosed and that one of them, a 61-year-old man, has died.

For now, the officials are calling the virus an "unknown cause of viral pneumonia."

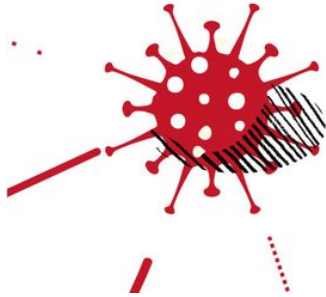
Most of the infected people are vendors and shoppers at the local seafood market. No clear evidence of human-to-human transmission so far according to the officials.

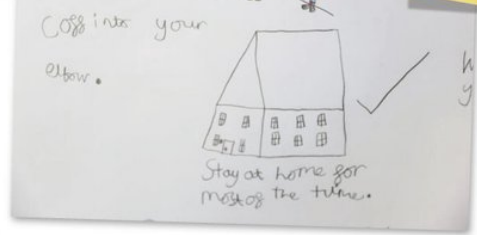


China's Wuhan ends its coronavirus lockdown

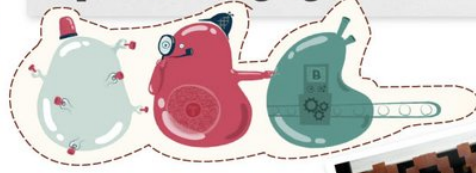
