No concrete results have happened re Korean reconciliation, largely in part b/c of the US "hostile" policy of demanding the DPRK's complete denuclearization and Moon always going back to sitting on the fence, unable to deliver on his Sunshine Policy.

@nknewsorg @andreilankov 10/Which leaves the DPRK no choice but to do what the USA or any country would do: Press on forward defending the national interest. W/ future diplomatic relations w/ the US uncertain they have to secure their nuclear deterrence force to face any contingency.

I'm convinced North Korea is willing to "reconcile" with South Korea at any time, w/ a caveat: They won't sacrifice their Juche socialism or their sovereignty to do so. I find their rational more sound than the US & ROK's

Just surrender your nukes and borders and you can be 2nd-class citizens of One Capitalist South Korea." Prediction: Reconciliation will not happen until the US & ROK give the respect sovereign DPRK deserves.

Like corral reefs which determine the shape of waves breaking overhead, which no one sees except for surfers who ride the waves, ideological realities are what largely determine the trajectory of diplomacy.
