My <u>@PhillyInquirer</u> colleagues and I have spent months speaking to Pennsylvania voters who support the president and deeply believe in a perceived political reality that is Not. Based. In. Fact. The social media echo chamber where these voters often get their news reinforces it 3/

Before Nov. 3, I met a kind, well-meaning man in PA's rural Cambria County who told me earnestly that Joe Biden was being controlled by Bernie Sanders through an ear piece. He knew so be he'd read it online. He deeply believed what he'd read. Should I have told him the truth? 4/

As reporters, we're trained to lay out the facts. But a huge portion of the electorate doesn't understand anymore how to distinguish truth from lies. Our profession is built around truth and accountability. And some of the people who are most misinformed call us their enemy 5/

So when House Rs objected to Lamb's statement last night, I thought. Do they know? Can THEY distinguish truth from lies? Or has this cancer of misinformation infected our elected officials, too? There was almost a fist fight over which reality America should believe 6/
